#### 72-HOUR EMERGENCY KITS

It is always a good idea to have an emergency kit prepared at your home, at all times. Your kit should include, but not be limited to, the following items: bottles of water, canned food, manual can opener, flashlight and batteries, extra batteries, first aid kit, special needs items (eg. medications, list of allergies, etc.), canes, walker, hearing aids, breathing apparatus, identification, cash, emergency contact list.

#### SOURCE WATER PROTECTION INFORMATION FOR RESIDENTS

#### **Ways to Protect Water Sources in Winter**

- 1. Only use the minimum amount of road salt and do not use salt within 100 metres of a well head.
- 2. Do not use salt if it is colder that -18°C. It will not work, sand and salt mix is better.
- 3. Do not shovel snow into sewers, waterways and at the end of culverts.
- 4. Shovel often during snow falls to reduce salt use.
- 5. Cover your salt storage to keep it from washing away and leaching into the water system.
